



#### Water Festival Regatta



### MEMBER SPOTLIGHT



#### WOODY NORWOOD

The annual Catboat Rally was held May 3-6, 2023, and for the 15th year, Woody Norwood chaired the event. Woody is Captain of the fleet of Catboats at BYSC and has served as Founder/Chairman of the Classic Boat Rally and its' successor Catboat Rally since 2006.

Woody grew up in Atlanta and began sailing at Lake Allatoona as a child in the 1950's. He recalls heading up to the lake on summer weekends, stopping on the way for 50 lbs. of ice because there was no electricity yet at the "Allatoona Reservoir" as it was known at the time. The Atlanta Yacht Club was formed in 1950 and Woody's parents were among the earliest members. They bought a Snipe class boat that year and an Opti for Woody, who was 9. By age 11 Woody was skippering his own 15 ½-foot Snipe class sailboat with his younger sister, Beth, crewing. Woody sailed in the U.S. Snipe Nationals as a junior and as a senior throughout the 1950's, finishing 3rd twice in the Juniors. He also served as Commodore of the Juniors at AYC.

Woody enrolled at Vanderbilt in 1959, but in 1961 he transferred to Tulane University where he was elected Racing Team Captain for the Tulane University Sailing Club (TUSC) in 1961-62 and then Commodore of TUSC in 1962-63. After graduating from Tulane, he earned an MBA in Finance from The University of Chicago's Graduate School of Business (1965) and then lived for two years in New York City where he crewed on the 36-foot yawl "Escape" owned by Harlow Reed, on the Long Island Sound circuit.

While building a successful career in corporate finance, Woody relocated back to Atlanta and regained his interest in the Snipe Class. He campaigned a series of Snipes in the 1980s to the early 2000s in regional, national, and world events that took him to Spain, Portugal, Bermuda, Nassau, Denmark, Norway, Argentina, Italy, and Japan, as well as many sailing venues around the USA. In addition to competing in world events, Woody also served as captain in bareboat charters in the Virgin Islands of the Caribbean and the Whitsunday Islands in Australia, and along the Turkish coast of the Aegean.

In 2004 Woody had a new "Herreshoff 12 ½" (waterline length, 16' LOA) built for him by Cape Cod Shipbuilders in Wareham, MA, and that brought him to Beaufort where the only people he knew were Frank and Marilyn Pontious. Frank had served as Commodore of Atlanta Yacht Club as had Woody, and they had been Snipe Class competitors for over a decade. At the end of a week of sailing around Beaufort in his H 12 1/2, Woody purchased a second home in Beaufort in 2005 and joined BYSC (he permanently relocated from Atlanta to Beaufort in 2011).

In 2005, Frank Pontious helped Woody sail the Herreshoff from Savannah to Charleston, in a unique adventure. This became, in 2006, the Classic Boat Rally, which has garnered more national attention than any other sailing event in Beaufort. This popular annual race is now known as the Catboat Rally, with a course from the Savannah Yacht Club to Beaufort with an overnight stop on Hilton Head at the South Carolina Yacht Club in Windmill Harbour.

After racing a series of sailboats that included a Flicka 20 (which Woody sailed to Nova Scotia on the Atlantic Ocean "outside" in 2010), a Compac 16, a Cape Dory 22, and a Marshall 18 Sanderling catboat, Woody settled on a Marshall 15 ½ Sandpiper named "Celadon" which, at the age of 82, he finds "fast, challenging, fun, and (relatively) easy to manage.

Woody's contributions to the club include helping to build up the fleet of catboats, numbering 11+, which is now the most active sailing fleet at BYSC. He has served as PRO (Principal Race Officer) as well as on the BYSC Board of

Directors for three years.

Few people know that Woody's heritage goes back to the very early years of South Carolina. His direct forebears were among the earliest immigrants to Charleston, Edisto Island, and Beaufort and include one of the founders of Beaufort in 1711, Edmund Bellinger. Woody's father grew up in Marion, S.C. and was a graduate of The Citadel as well as MUSC Medical School. His grandfather was the principal owner of The First National Bank of Marion, and a graduate of Furman College and The Wharton School. Woody's great grandfather was a prominent banker in South Carolina in the late 19th century and was the biggest donor to Furman in that century.

Woody's wife of 20 years, Alice, passed away from cancer in January 2000. He remains very close to his two children from a previous marriage, four grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. Woody was fortunate enough to reconnect recently with a friend that he met many years ago on the racing circuit, Priscilla "PJ" Hill from Fort Worth, TX. PJ is also a lifelong sailing enthusiast and she and Woody look forward to pursuing their love of sailing together.
